

WE ARE BETTER TOGETHER

2014 was another exciting year with ENP as we continue to seek transformation within our Fresno Neighborhoods. 111,000 volunteer hours were logged this year, which is a new high for us. It is a privilege to work alongside 64 churches, 24 community based organizations, 2 universities, 6 businesses and hundreds of neighborhood residents. We share a common mission with the City of Fresno, Fresno Unified, and other organizations for healthy, thriving neighborhoods, children excelling academically, and seeing families engaged in our schools and communities. Our efforts are aligned. It's Collective Impact! We are better together!

Saturday Sports Programs continue to grow with 30 programs going on all over town. Nearly 3,500 kids attended last year, most in SE & SW Fresno. Saturday Sports is the perfect place to gather, connect with children, and engage with parents. It is encouraging to see parents envision themselves as future leaders in their neighborhoods. We are refocusing the role of ENP as well as the role of our partnership church leaders, to support parents so THEY can be the agents of change within their own neighborhoods.

We are also taking advantage of Saturday Sports as the perfect platform for mobilizing volunteers not just from our churches but from Fresno State and Fresno Pacific as well. These volunteer opportunities give students the ability to not only serve, but also get a better understanding of the needs in our city as well as opportunities to serve throughout their lifetime.

All this because folks like you share our vision to see The Church mobilized in our city. We couldn't do it without you. Your continued support allows us to carry on the work our faith calls us to do and together we can have a direct spiritual and social impact on children, families, neighborhoods, and ultimately, our city!

OUR MISSION



STEP 4 - PARENT ENGAGEMENT

Engaging, equipping, and supporting parents in our partnership neighborhoods, encouraging them to utilize their unique cultural gifts and talents to bless and serve their school and community.

In 2014, twenty-five parents attended Abundant Communities Leadership Development Conference where they learned to look at the assets in their community and ways they can work together to strengthen their community as they serve and lead.

STEP 5 - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The process of the church working within the realm of job creation, job readiness and job placement as a micro-economic engine for the neighborhood.

The ultimate goal of Step 5 is to meet people where they are at, identify their needs and help them acquire the skills and training they need to be employable. When ENP began in 2008 our vision for Step 5 was for partnership churches to start up businesses with the purpose of providing job training for residents in those neighborhoods. This process can take many years and the majority of churches may not have the capacity to undertake something this grand. However we have seen an increase in partnerships reaching out to residents with programs such as GED & English classes, financial workshops and soft skills training as ways to make folks more employable.

We have teamed with several community benefit organizations on economic development along with the Workforce Connection to provide outreach opportunities that address this extreme need at various levels for more impact.

You'll see in the diagram below a "pipeline" with organizations that are helping folks transition from "hard to hire" to "job ready", becoming employable with a higher paying jobs that will allow them to support their families. Working together with other organizations has increased the number of resources available to families in our partnership neighborhoods. This is another example of collective impact.




2014 INCOME & EXPENSE
